Course Descriptions**Credits*****CHILD 120 Infants and Toddlers****(1:1:0:0)**

In this course students will explore ways to foster normal development of infants and toddlers including physical, cognitive, social, and emotional domains of development. Application to parenting and other care giving situations will be investigated.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 150 Foundations of Early Childhood**(3:3:0:0)**

This is an introductory course for those who will work with children in preschool or after school settings. This course will provide an overview of work in these areas: historical foundations of working professionally with children, curricular models, professional issues, and educational practices including those that are developmentally appropriate.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 210 Child Development**(3:3:0:0)**

This course is a theoretical, academically oriented course focusing on the physical, cognitive, emotional, and social development of the child from conception through adolescence. Students will explore the influences of family, peers, and social institutions on the child's development.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 230 Curriculum for Young Children**(3:3:0:0)**

Prerequisite: (CHILD 150 and CHILD 210) or SPED 200

In this course students will learn the scope of the major areas of curriculum in early childhood education, focusing specifically on the preschool years. They will develop basic philosophy, skills, and materials needed to provide appropriate experiences for preschool-aged children that will foster their social, emotional, physical, and cognitive development.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 290R PPE Staff Seminar**(1:1:0:0)**

Repeatable Course: May earn maximum of 3 credits

Concurrent Requisites: ECD 360L or ECD 370L or ECD 380L

The purpose of this class is to provide an opportunity for all students who work in the campus preschool labs to meet together to discuss lab operations and receive in-service training. PPE students enrolled in ECD 360L, ECD 370L, and ECD 380L must enroll in this course for credit each semester they are enrolled in a preschool lab practicum.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 300 Infant and Toddler Development**(3:0:0)**

Prerequisites: CHILD 210 or ED 200 or PSYCH 201 or SPED 200

Concurrent requisites: CHILD 300 may NOT be taken with CHILD 310

This course involves an in-depth study of the child from conception to three years of age. Students will become familiar with various theoretical perspectives in each of the developmental domains of infancy and toddlerhood. They will discuss ethical and developmental issues arising because of technological advancement and investigate infant/toddler temperament, personality, and social/emotional development. Students will also explore the influence of mothers and fathers, and the parenting and teaching techniques that are most appropriate for infants and toddlers.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 310 Early and Middle Development**(3:3:0:0)**

Prerequisites: CHILD 210 or ED 200 or PSYCH 201 or SPED 200

Concurrent Requisites: CHILD 310 may NOT be taken with CHILD 300

Course Requirement: 30 Credits

This course will explore in depth the relationships between theory, core developmental concepts, and practice in the field of child development from preschool through middle childhood. Learning and application of various theoretical perspectives to explain and interpret children's development will be explored. Coursework includes reading, summarizing, and analyzing current research and developmental topics of interest. Students will master and apply research based norms in the physical, cognitive, emotional/social, and spiritual domains of human growth and development. Emphasis will be on the application of current research.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 320 Adolescent Development**(3:3:0:0)**

Prerequisites: CHILD 210 or PSYCH 201

Course Requirement: 30 Credits

In this course the adolescent experience will be examined within a developmental and social context, with emphasis on the importance of the family. Other contexts to be considered include peers, religion, community, schools, and broader cultural systems.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 325 Professional Development**(1:1:0:0)**

Prerequisites: CHILD 150 and (CHILD 300 or CHILD 310 or CHILD 320)

Course Requirements: Child Development Majors and Junior and Seniors Only

This course consists of the exploration and preparation for various career options in the child development field.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 330 Parent Education and Child Guidance**(2:2:0:0)**

Prerequisite: FAML 220

The purpose of this course is to prepare students to teach or deliver parent education in community or public settings. This course builds upon previous, required course work on parenting that was designed to help students develop a broad understanding of effective principles associated with guidance of children.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 340 Language, Literacy and Learning**(2:2:0:0)**

Prerequisite: CHILD 210

In this course students will study the acquisition of language and the development of literacy in children birth through age eight.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 345A School-Age Fundamental Principles**(1:1:0:0)**

Total Course Fees: \$75.00

Prerequisite: CHILD 310 and (CHILD 150 or SPED 200)

Co-requisite: CHILD 230

Course Requirements: Instructor Approval Required

In this course students will explore key issues in planning and implementing high quality, developmentally appropriate after school programming for children in K through 4th grade. Topics include: activity planning and delivery, positive behavior guidance and professionalism and team work. Students will apply knowledge and skills learned in the course in the after school program.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 345B School-Age Applied Principles**(1:1:0:0)**

Prerequisites: CHILD 230 and CHILD 310 and CHILD 345A and (CHILD 150 or SPED 200)

Concurrent Requisites: CHILD 345L and CHILD 350

Course Requirements: Instructor Approval Required

In this course students will explore key issues in planning and implementing high quality, developmentally appropriate after school programming for children in K through 4th grade. Topics include: activity planning and delivery, positive behavior guidance and professionalism and team work. Students will apply knowledge and skills learned in the course in the after school program.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 345L School-Age Lab Experience**(3:0:8:0)**

Concurrent Requisites: CHILD 345B and CHILD 350

Course Requirements: Prior semester application required

This course gives students a hands-on experience in school-age after school programming. Students will work in teams to plan and deliver high quality after school programming to children in K through 4th grade in a local elementary school. Under supervision, students will: plan and deliver developmentally appropriate learning activities to same age and mixed age groups, provide positive behavior guidance to children, practice professionalism in interacting with parents and school staff, and develop and strengthen effective team work skills.
(Fall, Winter)

CHILD 350 Observation and Assessment**(3:3:0:0)**

Concurrent Requisites: CHILD 345B or ECD 350L or ECD 360L or ECD 380L

This course is an introduction to the observation and assessment of children and their environments. The course will cover methods of documenting change that include informal and formal assessment, observation, and standardized assessment. Emphasis will be on ethics, psychometric theory, observation, screening, standardized, and authentic assessment. The selection, administration, and interpretation of observation and assessment tools and methods will be explored.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 390R Special Topics in Child Studies**(1-3:0:0:0)**

Repeatable Course: May earn maximum of 6 credits

Prerequisite: CHILD 210

This repeatable course deals with specialty areas related to the scholarly study of children.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

Home and Family

Brigham Young University–Idaho 2016-2017

CHILD 400 Research and Evaluation (3:3:0:0)

Prerequisites: FAML 300 or CHILD 310

This course explores the philosophies of critical inquiry. Principals of critiquing, designing, conducting, and reporting social science investigations will be explored. Students will understand how the research process is used in a scientific environment and in solving problems that arise in our daily lives. They will be able to critique research reported in both popular and scientific publications for its ability to appropriately carry out the basic steps of the research process. Students, as small groups, will understand how to take a basic question about human behavior and use one of several different research methodologies available to carry out a study that will provide insight about their question of interest. They will develop a basic understanding of the difference between positivist (quantitative) and interpretivist (qualitative) forms of research.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 440 Administrative Issues (3:3:0:0)

Prerequisites: CHILD 345L or ECD 350L or ECD 360L

This course explores the fundamental principles and skills for the administration of service-delivery programs for children, youth, and families. Course content includes philosophies, ethical guidelines, DAP in various contexts, staff and program administration, budget, health and safety, nutrition/food services, family involvement, child abuse reporting, and other legal/policy guidelines.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 495 Senior Seminar (1:1:0:0)

Prerequisites: ECD 350L or ECD 360L or CHILD 345L

Course Requirement: Must be Senior Standing (Recommended last semester prior to graduation.)

During this capstone course, students will meet together under faculty supervision to review disciplinary content across the five Child Development program outcomes. They will complete five assessments aligned with each of the program outcomes, and to finalize an individual e-portfolio documenting their successes as a student in the major.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

CHILD 498R Internship (2:0:0:0)

Repeatable Course: May earn maximum of 4 credits

Internship Fees: \$81.50 (LDS) \$163 (non-LDS) per credit

Exempt from tuition, but charged this independent course fee

Prerequisites: ECD 350L or ECD 360L or CHILD 345L

Corequisite: CHILD 440

This required course gives students the experience in selecting a professional child/family services job that they will work at for a minimum of 160 hours. Students will apply concepts and developmental knowledge that they gained in their major coursework to strengthen and enrich the lives of children and families, while deepening understanding and sharpening skills through hands on experiences and professional mentoring.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 350A Early Childhood Development: Toddler Fund Principles (1:1:0:0)

Total Course Fees: \$65.00

Co-requisites: CHILD 300 and (CHILD 150 or ED 200)

In this course students will learn how developmental knowledge, collaboration with families and professionals, and assessment are used to create developmentally appropriate activities for all toddlers. Music, movement, books, literacy, art, make believe, fine and gross motor, and sensory and blocks will be emphasized. The course will address licensing standards including CPR, First Aid, and background checks. This course should be taken the 2nd block of the semester before enrolling in the ECD 350L.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 350B Early Childhood Development: Toddler Applied Principles (2:2:0:0)

Prerequisites: ECD 350A and (CHILD 150 or ED 200) and CHILD 230 and CHILD 300

Concurrent requisites: ECD 350L; Child Development majors also need CHILD 350.

In this course students will practice and use developmental knowledge, collaboration with families and professionals, and assessment to prepare and create developmentally appropriate activities for all toddlers through play. Music, movement, books, literacy, art, make believe, fine and gross motor, and sensory and blocks will be emphasized.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 350L Early Childhood Development: Toddler Lab Experience (2:0:7:0)

Concurrent requisites: ECD 350B; Child Development majors also need CHILD 350.

Course Requirement: Prior semester application required

In this course students will receive knowledge and practical hands-on experience working with toddlers both with and without special needs and their families in a campus lab setting with a home visit component. In the lab, child focused planning will be determined by family collaboration, assessment, family identified goals and outcomes, Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) identified goals and outcomes, and child interest. Students will develop activity plans, perform assessments, monitor progress, and document growth based on these elements. They must apply to be accepted into this course the semester before they want to register. This course is a co-requisite to ECD 350B: Toddler Applied Principles.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 360A Early Childhood Development: Preschool Fund Principles (1:1:0:0)

Total Course Fees: \$65.00

Co-requisites: CHILD 150 and CHILD 210 (PPE Majors); ED 200 and CHILD 310 (ECSE Majors); CHILD 150 and CHILD 310 (CD Majors); ED 200 and CHILD 210 (FCS Majors)

In this course students will learn how developmental knowledge, collaboration with families and professionals, and assessment are used to prepare and create developmentally appropriate lesson plans for all pre-school aged children. The importance of play across curriculum areas will be emphasized. The course will address licensing standards including CPR, First Aid, and background checks. This course should be taken the 2nd block of the semester before enrolling in ECD 360L.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 360B Early Childhood Development: Preschool Applied Principles (2:2:0:0)

Prerequisites: ECD 360A and (CHILD 150 or ED 200) and (CHILD 210 or CHILD 310) and (CHILD 230 or FCS 205) or Instructor consent

Concurrent requisite: ECD 360L, Child Development majors with a General Emphasis will also need CHILD 350

In this course students will practice and use developmental knowledge, collaboration with families and professionals, and assessment to prepare and create developmentally appropriate lesson plans for all pre-school aged children. Curriculum development and implementation, child guidance, and observation and assessment will be emphasized. Students will be expected to apply knowledge learned from this course to the preschool practicum.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 360L Early Childhood Development: Preschool Lab Experience (2-4:0:12:0)

Concurrent requisites: ECD 360B, Child Development majors with a General Emphasis will also need CHILD 350; PPE and Child Development Early Child Development emphasis majors will also need CHILD 290R

Course Requirement: Instructor Authorization

In this course students will receive knowledge and practical hands-on experience working with preschool aged children both with and without special needs and their families in a campus lab setting with a home visit component. In the lab, child focused planning will be determined by family collaboration, assessment, family identified goals and outcomes, Individualized Education Programs (IEP) identified goals and outcomes, and child interest. This course will prepare the student to have experiential use and application of core principles, including developmentally appropriate practices, preschool curriculum development and implementation, child guidance, observation and assessment, and collaboration with parents and others.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 370 Early Childhood Development: Teaching Preschool (3:3:0:0)

Prerequisites: ECD 360B and CHILD 230

Concurrent Requisites: ECD 370L and CHILD 440

This course focuses on curriculum development, teaching and working with preschool children, and support of children's play with emphasis on lead teaching skills.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 370L Early Childhood Development: Teaching Preschool Lab (4:0:12:0)

Prerequisite: ECD 360L

Concurrent Requisites: ECD 370 and CHILD 290R

This course is a second level preschool practicum for students majoring in Professional Preschool Education. Students will function primarily as a lead teacher in the campus preschool laboratories, writing and implementing curriculum plans, and adapting curriculum for children with diverse abilities.

(Fall, Winter, Spring)

Home and Family

Brigham Young University–Idaho 2016-2017

ECD 380 Early Childhood Development: Program Management (2:2:0:0)

Prerequisites: CHILD 440 and ECD 370; Professional Preschool majors also need CHILD 350
Concurrent Requisites: ECD 380L and CHILD 350

In this course students will manage experiences for young children and their families. Students will collaborate and build the leadership skills required of a team. They will be responsible for record keeping, staff development, budget, in-service training, parent communication, accreditation, and operation of the early childhood environment. Discussion will focus on issues relating to the care and education of young children.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

ECD 380L Teaching Early Childhood: Program Management Lab (4:0:12:0)

Concurrent Requisites: ECD 380 and CHILD 290R

This course is the third level of teaching experience for educators working with young children. Students will demonstrate model teaching and coaching practices, provide needed in-service training to lab staff, and maintain lab facilities according to national accreditation standards.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 100 The Family (3:3:0:0)

This course applies gospel truth and a supportive scholarship to strengthen marriage and family relationships using *The Family: A Proclamation to the World* as the guiding framework.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 110 Marriage Skills (1:1:0:0)

This course consists of the foundational principles of successful marriages with application to strengthening marriages.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 120 Parenting Skills (1:1:0:0)

This course consists of foundational principles and basic skills of parent-child interaction. Students will apply typical decisions, problems, and opportunities encountered by parents.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 150 Introduction to Marriage and Family Studies (1:1:0:0)

This is an introductory and required course for all students desiring to obtain a major in marriage and Family. This course is inappropriate for non-majors. Students with a Marriage and Family minor may also enroll in the course. This course includes an overview of historical and current scientific, societal, and family issues related to the family sciences. Applications will be made to career and advanced educational opportunities, as well as family, church, and community settings.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 160 Family Relations (3:3:0:0)

This course overviews family development across the lifespan including the study of the family as a system, family interaction, family issues, and family roles. It will emphasize the relationship of the family and its environment with consideration of the cultural diversity and heritage of families.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 200 Preparation for Marriage (2:2:0:0)

This course highlights skills, attitudes, behaviors, and principles needed to prepare oneself for a strong marriage and to wisely select a marriage partner. Preparation for marriage is also emphasized by focusing on healthy practices related to dating, courtship, engagement, and the transition following marriage.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 220 Parenting (3:3:0:0)

This course involves a study of theories, principles, and practices needed to build nurturing and supportive parent-child relationships and to guide children toward healthy developmental outcomes.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 300 Marriage (3:3:0:0)

This course focuses on contemporary issues affecting marriage, along with skills and principles needed to build strong and successful marriages.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 360 Family Stress and Coping (3:3:0:0)

Course Requirement: Sophomore, Junior or Senior standing

This course involves a study of families under stress, including the many external and internal influences that play a role in determining a family's experience of stress. An ecological model will be used to understand potential risk factors that pose problems for families, along with protective factors that help families to be resilient. Focus will be maintained to learn ways to help families under stress.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 390R Special Topics in Family Studies (0.5-4:0:0:0)

Repeatable Course: May earn maximum of 4 credits

This repeating variable credit course deals with specialty areas relating to marriage and family. For topics, see class schedule.
(Spring)

FAML 400 Family Theories and Dynamics (3:3:0:0)

Course Requirement: Junior or Senior standing

This course involves an in-depth look at family theories and their assumptions including: systems theory, exchange theory, family development theory, and symbolic interactionism and ecological theory. Family processes related to power, communication, dysfunctions and addictions, rules and patterns of interaction, distance regulation, and family rituals will be explored. Students will use theory to develop intervention and prevention programs.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 420 The Helping Relationship (3:3:0:0)

Course Requirement: Junior or Senior standing

This skill based course prepares students to effectively use interpersonal communication skills associated with helping individuals and families in a variety of settings. Role playing will be one of the primary learning methods. These skills are especially valuable for students planning to enter a human service profession, counseling/therapy, or planning to pursue graduate studies.
(Winter, Spring)

FAML 430 Family and Community Relationships (3:3:0:0)

Total Course Fees: \$60.00

Course Requirement: Junior or Senior standing

This course consists of ecological and gospel perspectives on providing family-focused prevention and intervention services and support to diverse families. Emphasis will be on communicating with families, empowering parents, developing family and professional partnerships, interagency collaboration, and accessing and linking families and community resources.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 445 Family Practicum (4:3:3:0)

Prerequisites: (FAML 150 and FAML 160 and FAML 220 and FAML 300 and FCS 340) or (NUTR 150 and FCS 160 and FCS 340)

This course will give students practical experience by having them prepare the curriculum needed to teach a workshop or seminar on some aspect of family life. After preparing the curriculum, students will market the program, conduct the workshop, and evaluate the effectiveness of the education. A strong emphasis will be placed on how to teach effectively in group settings.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 460 Child and Family Advocacy (3:3:0:0)

Total Course Fees: \$50.00

Course Requirement: Junior or Senior standing

This course focuses on current challenges or issues being experienced by children and families and on the development of public policies to address these issues. An ecological approach to the study of policy formation with the aim of gaining knowledge and skills to successfully advocate for appropriate and effective child and family policies will be explored.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FAML 498R Internship (2-4:0:0:0)

Repeatable Course: May earn maximum of 4 credits

Internship Fees: \$81.50 (LDS) \$163 (non-LDS) per credit

Exempt from tuition, but charged this independent course fee

Prerequisite: FAML 445

In this course students will apply their knowledge and skills by working in a family or human service setting that services children or families. Students will also gain applied knowledge by receiving supervision from an on-site supervisor.
(Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 101 Introduction to Family and Consumer Science (2:2:0:0)

Formerly: HFED 101
 This course covers basic concepts, philosophy, career exploration, and professional development in the Family and Consumer Science area.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 110 Food Safety and Sanitation (1:1:0:0)

Students will learn proper food safety and sanitation processes in preparation for gaining a food safety and sanitation industry-based certification. Credit will be granted upon successful completion of the Certification Examination.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 140 Introduction to Interior Design (3:3:0:0)

Formerly: HFED 140
 This course provides students with a broad introduction to residential interior design. Specific topics include: the process and profession of design; the elements and principles of design; color theory; floor plans, housing, and building systems; architectural detail; furniture selection and arrangement; space planning; universal and sustainable design; lighting; interior finishes, window treatments, and accessories.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 150 Practical Homemaking (2:1:2:0)

Formerly: HFED 150
 Total Course Fees: \$20.00
 In this course students rotate on a four-week basis in areas covering food preparation, basic sewing, and interior decorating. Emphasis is on practical, hands-on learning experiences.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 160 Home and Family Resource Management (3:3:0:0)

Formerly: HFED 160
 Total Course Fees: \$15.55
 This course examines the basic, timeless concepts underlying the field of management including values, goal-setting, decision-making, resources, and planning as it relates to the home and family. Practical application of course content with the 7 Habits of Highly Effective College Students to build new, lasting behaviors of effectiveness as an individual and within families will be explored.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 205 Family and Consumer Sciences Practicum (2:1:2:0)

Formerly: HFED 205
 This course is an introduction to Family and Consumer Science Education classes in secondary schools. The curriculum is based on Idaho Core Teacher Standards for secondary education.
 (Winter)

FCS 207 Clothing Construction I (2:1:2:0)

Formerly: HFED 207
 Total Course Fees: \$11.00
 This course is for those with little or no sewing experience. Students will learn the application of construction principles from commercial patterns in making apparel. Emphasis will be on basic construction techniques and fundamental fitting. Materials approximately cost \$50 or more.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 208 Fashion Design and Merchandising (2:2:0:0)

Formerly: HFED 208
 Students will gain an understanding of the basics of fashion design and merchandising, and develop a business plan for marketing their personal skills and abilities in the area of fashion.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 221 Home Decor Design (2:1:2:0)

Formerly: HFED 221
 This basic how-to course is designed to teach construction techniques for home decor sewing. Pillows, pillow shams, dust ruffles, duvet covers, bedspreads, quilts, table linens, and window treatments will be included. Students are required to furnish the fabric and notions for individual projects. Materials cost approximately \$30 to \$60 or more.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 235 Children's Clothing Design (2:1:1:0)

Formerly: HFED 235
 Total Course Fees: \$11.00
 This course involves the selection and construction of children's clothing using the serger and sewing machine. Projects include bib, booties, sleeper, t-shirt, cap, pants, dress, and coat. No sewing experience is required. Materials cost approximately \$45.00 or more.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 240 Food Preparation (2:1:2:0)

Formerly: HFED 110
 Total Course Fees: \$50.00
 Students will develop skills in food preparation through a hands-on laboratory experience that allows them to practice appropriate techniques in food preparation.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 245 Pattern Making (3:2:1:0)

Formerly: HFED 245
 This course covers the principles of pattern making using basic drafting and flat-pattern techniques in half and full size patterns for woven and knit fabrics.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 280 History of Architecture & Interiors (3:3:0:0)

This course is a survey of the development of Western architecture, interiors, furniture, and furnishings from ancient periods to the present. Students will gain an understanding of the social, cultural, and historical context affecting change in periods/styles through the ages. Assignments will provide opportunities to recognize interior and architectural details and how past design influences the present.
 (Winter, Spring)

FCS 307 Advanced Sewing Construction (4:3:3:0)

Formerly: HFED 307
 Total Course Fees: \$11.00
 Prerequisite: FCS 207
 In this course advanced construction techniques will be applied to portfolio samples along with practical application projects including serger project, plaid shirt, fly front pants, recycling, and lined project. Materials cost approximately \$70 or more.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 340 Money Management (3:3:0:0)

Formerly: HFED 340
 This course covers financial concepts of direct concern to the individual or family. Budgeting, financial institutions and services, consumer buying, use and control of credit, financial records, buying and selling homes, insurance, and basic investments will be explored.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 345 Fitting and Alteration (3:2:2:0)

Formerly: HFED 345
 Total Course Fees: \$30.00
 Prerequisites: FCS 245 and FCS 307
 This course involves the basic fitting and alteration of women's patterns from constructed and ready-to-wear apparel clothing. Materials cost approximately \$50 or more.
 (Fall, Winter)

FCS 351 Food Service Management (3:2:3:0)

Formerly: HFED 351
 Prerequisites: FCS 110
 Total Course Fees: \$80.00
 Concepts of managing a food service operation, i.e. cost controls, data analysis, and future forecasting.
 (See department for scheduling)

FCS 360 Textile Science (3:2:2:0)

Formerly: HFED 360
 Total Course Fees: \$11.00
 This course involves the study of fabric such as fiber, yarns, and methods of construction and finishes. Students will apply this information to personal and client use.
 (Fall, Winter)

FCS 364 Science of Meal Management (3:2:2:0)
 Formerly: HFED 240
 Total Course Fees: \$50.00
 This course involves the implementation of meal management principles as they relate to controlling cost, providing satisfying meals, entertaining, conserving time and energy, using modern kitchen technology, and ensuring food safety. Students will plan and prepare food for meal service.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

FCS 370 Quantity Food Production and Services (3:2:2:0)
 Total Course Fees: \$50.00
 Prerequisite: FCS 240
 This course will teach the how, what, and why of producing high quality foods in large quantity. Techniques in quantity food production will be acquired as students apply standards and principles of converting recipes, keeping inventory of ingredients, and implementing correct food safety practices while preparing high quality food products.
 (Fall, Winter)

FCS 380 Connect Education and Employment (3:3:0:0)
 Formerly: HFED 380
 Total Course Fees: \$75.00
 Prerequisites: FCS 101 and FCS 205
 Course Requirement: FCS Majors Only
 This course is an advanced study of coordinated work experience in the educational setting of Professional Technical Education. The focus of the course is to provide the skills and knowledge needed for the professional teacher to be competent in creating and maintaining a cooperative education or school-to-work system. It includes foundation of Professional Technical education, coordination of work-based learning programs, career pathways and guidance, organizing and working with occupational advisory committees, and organization and administration of student groups.
 (Fall, Winter)

FCS 400 Curriculum Development in Occupational Education (3:3:0:0)
 Formerly: HFED 450
 Prerequisite: FCS 380
 Course Requirement: Seniors Only
 This course is a teacher preparation class for family and consumer science majors. The development of curriculum focuses upon meeting the needs of secondary education students, multicultural students and adult learners. SecED 492 must be taken the following semester.
 (Winter)

FCS 405 Teaching Methods for Family and Consumer Science (3:3:0:0)
 Formerly: HFED 405
 Total Course Fees: \$65.00
 Prerequisite: FCS 400
 Course Requirement: Seniors Only
 This class is preparation for secondary teaching, with application of teaching methods and theories used in a Family and Consumer Sciences secondary classroom. SecEd 492 must be taken the following semester.
 (Fall, Winter)

FCS 490R Special Studies in FCS (1-3:0:0:0)
 Formerly: HFED 490R
 Repeatable Course: May earn maximum of 12 credits or maximum of 4 enrollments
 Course Requirement: Instructor Approval Required
 Special updates in Family and Consumer Sciences Education topics. Repeatable for variable credit.
 (Fall, Winter)

FCS 498R Internship for FCSE Major (1-6:0:0:0)
 Formerly: HFED 498R
 Repeatable Course: May earn maximum of 6 credits
 Internship Fees: \$81.50 (LDS) \$163 (non-LDS) per credit
 Exempt from tuition, but charged this independent course fee
 Internship for Home and Family minor or secondary education vocational endorsement. Opportunity to link academic learning with industry experience. Recommended to be taken as work experience while off track. One credit hour required for occupational endorsement in Family and Consumer Science. 160 work hours are required.
 (Fall, Winter, Spring)

HFED 364 Introduction to Food Science (4:3:2:0)
 Total Course Fees: \$50.00
 Prerequisites: CHEM 101 or higher and NUTR 150 and FCS 110
 In this course, students learn about the chemical and physical properties of foods relative to preparation and processing.
 (Fall)
